

HOW TO READ A PUBLICATION BALLOT (1/26/26)

Kenton County has:

- Four (4) Senatorial Districts
- Six (6) House of Representative Districts
- Three (3) County Commissioners
- Nineteen (19) Cities
- Five (5) Independent School Districts
- One (1) Common School District with 5 divisions.

This means there are many combinations for a ballot. A publication ballot is created for voters to determine what will be on their specific ballot.

How to read the PUBLICATION BALLOT.



First, you need your precinct code and name.

Visit www.govote.ky.gov and click on “Review Your Registration”: Put in first name, last name and date of birth to see your party affiliation, precinct name and precinct code.





FOR A PRIMARY ELECTION: There will be columns for Democrat or Republican races. Depending on what is on the ballot there may be a Non-Partisan column as well.


FOR A GENERAL ELECTION: The first item on everyone's ballot will be the Straight Ticket option.



Straight ticket is a convenience for the voter to choose a specific party which then selects all the candidates in that political party. The voter would not have to fill in the oval in front of each candidate. This does not take care of any of the non-Partisan races like judicial races, school boards or city races.



Next there will be races that will have the words "***ALL PRECINCTS***" under the race. This means this race is everyone's ballot.



Next will be races that list specific precincts underneath them. This race only appears on those precinct specific ballots.

Find your precinct code and name. In the example, BRM (A125) is the Precinct code A125 and precinct name Bromley.

There may be language that says "PART OF"

Part of ERL 3 (C113)

This means this precinct has more than one ballot option called a "split". Precinct splits can be between two school boards or between a city and county property.
